

### **UMC'S HISTORY**


- UMC has been part of the fabric of our community since 1931, when it was a simple one-room clinic run by one physician and one nurse.
- In 1940, Clark County Indigent Hospital changed its name to Clark County General Hospital, later becoming Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital in the 1950s.
- In 1986, the hospital's name changed again to University Medical Center of Southern Nevada, reflecting its role as a teaching institution and a medical center offering complete care.



# QUICK CARE VS ER

- As others continue to push stand-alone emergency rooms that charge ER prices for even the most routine care, UMC prioritizes the needs of our community by introducing new Quick Care locations.
- UMC offers 10 convenient Quick Care locations across the valley.
- These clinics significantly improve access to care and prevent unnecessary and costly ER visits.
- A 2022 study found that about 13 to 27 percent of ER visits can be addressed in ambulatory settings.
- UMC is exploring the possibility of 24hour access through our Quick Care model for adult and pediatric patients.






- The ONLY Verified Burn Center in Nevada.
- Provides inpatient and outpatient care for more than 8,300 patients each year.
- One of only a handful of hospitals across the nation to receive verification as a Burn Center.
- Recently performed the state's first laser therapy procedures to treat burn scars.
- Treats many burn patients with revolutionary spray-on skin cells generated from a small sample of the patient's skin.





- The ONLY Designated Pediatric Trauma Center in Southern Nevada.
- Offers a Pediatric Emergency
   Department, Pediatric and Neonatal
   Intensive Care, and a Pediatric Sedation
   Unit, in addition to other key services.
- Staffed around the clock with in-hospital, Board-Certified Pediatric Critical Care and Emergency Medicine Physicians.
- The ONLY hospital in Nevada to offer a Verified Pediatric Burn Center.





### **ACADEMIC MEDICINE**

- UMC is Nevada's premier academic medical center and has participated in medical education for more than 30 years.
- UMC is the anchor hospital for the Kirk Kerkorian School of Medicine at UNLV, allowing the hospital to train 66 medical students per class and about 340 residents/fellows in 20 accredited training programs at UMC.
- UMC remains committed to addressing the local shortage of physicians while training the next generation of medical professionals to care for our community.







- No need has been identified for an additional Level I Trauma Center.
- Quality care requires repetition and volume.
- Dilution of trauma volume diminishes
   quality and reduces opportunities to train
   military and civilian medical professionals.
- Unnecessarily expanding our trauma system would create waste, increase costs and erode expertise.



#### TRAUMA SYSTEM

- The Southern Nevada Trauma System is functioning well, with capacity to care for even more patients within the four existing trauma centers.
- Median transport time of 16 minutes and 36 seconds.
- There have been NO INCIDENTS in which patients or EMS could not access a trauma center in a timely manner.
- The decision to expand our trauma system must be based on needs assessments and population studies.
- The Regional Trauma Advisory Board voted overwhelmingly in opposition to the application for another Level I Trauma Center.
