CCFD protects infrastructure critical to regional and national security, the nation's 5th largest school district, University of NV, Las Vegas, operates the County Office of Emergency Management, and safeguards the Las Vegas Strip—the world famous resort corridor known as the Entertainment Capital of the World—populated by over 50 high-rise properties and the Las Vegas Convention Center (4.6-million-sq-ft; hosting 6 million attendees). CCFD also safeguards Sphere—a \$2.3 billion, 20,000 capacity entertainment venue and large-scale events including Formula 1, NASCAR, Wrestlemania 41, UFC International Fight Week, conventions, trade

shows, and international symposiums. The jurisdiction is also a major logistics and energy hub. Each year, the 5th largest airport in the nation—Harry Reid International—serves 56.5 million passengers. Critical transportation infrastructure encompasses Interstate 15 and U.S. Highways 95 and 93. NV-DOT reports 19.2 billion vehicle miles traveled on area roadways plus classified shipments of hazardous materials like propane, lithium-ion batteries, and nuclear waste bound for Yucca Mountain (up to 10 trucks per day traveling rural routes). Railways include Union Pacific Railroad, the Las Vegas Monorail, and the upcoming Brightline West high-speed rail system. Calnev Pipeline supplies nearly 95% of the region's gasoline, diesel, and jet fuel, while hundreds of miles of Southern NV Water Authority and Southwest Gas pipelines traverse the jurisdiction, largely aligned with major highway corridors. In CCFD's jurisdiction, Black Mountain Industrial complex includes titanium metal and multiple other chemical processing plants, an L-3 Internet Service Provider, Switch Comm, and power stations. BLM designated federally preferred energy corridors within Clark County (Energy Policy Act of 2005). These corridors support current and future rights-of-way for oil, natural gas, and hydrogen pipelines, as well as high-voltage electric transmission and distribution infrastructure, facilitating long-distance energy transport critical to regional and national systems. The department provides early response to critical water resources including Hoover Dam, Davis Dam, Lake Mead, Colorado River tributaries, and regional groundwater systems, as well as agricultural lands, wetlands, and habitats supporting endangered species like desert tortoise and bighorn sheep. These areas attract millions of annual visitors for off-roading, hiking, camping, shooting sports, and hunting—especially during peak season—putting additional strain on already limited resources across CCFD's vast response area. CCFD provides mutual aid to Nellis Air Force Base, 5 neighboring cities—Las Vegas, N. Las Vegas, Henderson, Boulder City and Mesquite—plus adjacent Federal lands, where skeletal/seasonal staffing increases reliance on local response.

Describe your financial need and how consistent it is with the intent of the AFG Program. CCFD operates in a high-demand environment with one of the highest per-capita call volumes in the U.S., a transient population, and multiple designated Opportunity Zones, all of which increase reliance on emergency services while limiting a stable tax base. The County depends heavily on tourism revenue, which continues to decline following COVID-19 impacts. Tourism in 2025 decreased 7.5% from 2024, with December visitation down 9.2% year over year. Gaming revenue declined 5–8% annually, hotel occupancy dropped over 3, average daily room rates fell 5%, and RevPAR declined 8.8%. Among 38 County departments, competition for limited general funds constrains municipal investment in public safety, restricting apparatus, training, and equipment. 93% of the operating budget is

committed to fixed, recurring costs, leaving insufficient funds to support 33 urban/career stations, 10 rural/volunteer stations, 790 uniformed personnel, and complex, high-risk response demands. Property tax, \$118,219,867; consolidated tax, \$75,426,661; transport fees, \$119,049.00; wildland revenue, \$78,382.15; interest income, \$10,236,564; and grants, \$11,907,030 provide revenue. 93% of the operating budget is allocated toward fixed-cost operations. Expenses include \$232,430,251 in salaries/benefits; \$22,527,903 for services and supplies (medical supplies, food, cleaning supplies, minor equipment, office supplies, furniture, fuel, dues/subscriptions); \$5,605,386 for internal services (automotive, IT support services, print costs, telephone, education, and training); \$845,182 for travel and outside training; \$18,978,949 for building improvements; and \$47,122,363 for equipment. CCFD is now obligated to a long-term, interest-bearing loan to build a fire training center. Revenues are derived from 95% taxes, 1% EMS billing, and 4% grants, limiting flexibility and capacity. With 3-8% tax caps, residents cannot support increased taxes, fees, or EMS billing. Numerous Federal, state, county facilities, parks, religious facilities, colleges, and UNLV do not contribute. As one of the top 5 states for highest fuel costs, Nevada gas prices exceed \$4.90, increasing operational expenses and burden on residents. Poverty, inflation, and utility and housing costs exceed national averages, while uninsured rates remain high, increasing reliance on emergency services. US News and World Report ranks NV 47th for healthcare access and AARP ranks NV 49th for affordability/access to long-term care. The State ranks 46th in the nation for child well-being and the public school system ranks 48th. NV ranks 50th in the US for mental health (MH) care access; 60% of youth dealing with major depression do not receive MH care. Median home prices increased over 35% between 2021 and 2022, homelessness rose 20% since 2023, and a growing senior population, now about 16% and largely on fixed incomes, further limits the community's ability to absorb increased taxes or fees. Rising costs, inflation, and fluctuations in tourism revenue—an economic driver for the

region—have outpaced income growth, reducing available public funding. Approximately 30% of the workforce is employed in service, retail, and transportation sectors, which are lower-wage and limit the local tax base. The County also experiences ongoing revenue loss from vacant, foreclosed, and undeveloped properties, including parcels held for future development on the Las Vegas Strip. Nevada has no state tax and is rarely able to support FF operations, making AFG funding essential to operational readiness and life safety in this high-risk, high-demand jurisdiction. All fire capital from the general fund is allocated to construction of an invaluable fire training center, which will be the only one in Southern NV. In compliance with all deliverables, CCFD is currently managing over 45 federal, state, and private grants, but no alternative funding exists for critical equipment and apparatus.

With one of the fastest-growing metropolitan areas in the U.S, Clark County's population is projected to reach 3 million by 2045, with growth of 5.8%–6.2% from 2020 to 2024/2025. Influx adds thousands of residents annually, increasing call volume and service demand. Adults age 65-plus now exceed 15.5% of the population, comprising one of the fastest-growing west coast senior populations. Limited access to home-based care and long-term support enhance dependability upon emergency services. EMS call volume increased 17% between 2024-2025. Aging infrastructure—including older residential areas, high-rise buildings, and roadways—elevates risk of structure fires, system failures, traffic incidents, and response delays. One-quarter of state bridges are over 50 years old. Water shortages, including a projected 7% decline tied to Colorado River reductions, strain fire suppression capacity, particularly in dense developments. Expanded transport of hazardous materials, including lithium batteries and ammonia, and rapid growth of solar and lithium-ion battery storage facilities introduce high-risk, complex fire conditions requiring specialized response. Natural disasters—including long-term drought and extreme wildland fire risk in

Southern Nevada’s rural areas and surrounding federal lands—continue to increase incident frequency and severity, stretching already limited resources. CCFD’s first-line response area includes the suburban and rural communities not within the incorporated, neighboring cities of Las Vegas, North Las Vegas, Henderson, Boulder City or Mesquite. Mutual and auto aid areas encompass each incorporated area above plus Nellis Air Force Base, the Moapa Valley region, San Bernardino County (the largest contiguous county in the U.S. by land mass), and bordering lands managed by Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service, Fish and Wildlife Service, and US Forest Service. This burden, combined with deployments to increasingly frequent national wildfires, reduces the availability of apparatus and personnel for CCFD’s immediate response areas.

Please describe your organization and/or community that you serve. **One of the busiest, largest fire departments in the nation, Clark County Fire Department (CCFD) is a renowned tourist destination. Located in the 11th geographically expansive county, it encompasses dense urban areas inclusive of the Las Vegas Strip plus extensive rural areas with extreme wildfire risk. CCFD provides first-in response across 8,012 square-miles in Southern Nevada—land area larger than that of Connecticut, Delaware, and Rhode Island combined. With over 150,000 responses annually, CCFD provides advanced EMS, suppression, investigation, prevention, public safety education, HazMat, aircraft, and technical rescue. It operates the County Office of Emergency Management and provides first-due response to H. Reid International Airport. Multiple census tracts are opportunity zones; Federal screening tools cite adverse factors to daily living, including a 13% poverty rate. With only 33 paid urban stations and 13 rural volunteer stations, CCFD's 766 paid and 150 volunteer FFs protect a permanent population base of 1 million people. Annual visitors exceed 29 million, and 56.5 million people travel through Harry Reid International Airport (the 5th largest U.S. airport) each year. Traffic congestion—fueled by 19.2 billion vehicle miles traveled a year countywide (NV-DOT)—increases call volume, especially along I-15, US-95 and US-93. CCFD also safeguards the Nation's 5th largest school district, University of NV Las Vegas, Colorado River tributaries, Lake Mead, Hoover Dam, agriculture, and habitats supporting outdoor**

recreation plus endangered species. In CCFD's primary response area, Las Vegas tourism draws approximately 39 million visitors each year. Crises like the Mandalay Bay shooting and MGM Grand fire highlight the area's massive, complex risks. Responding to over 400 incidents per day, frontline FF units include 749 EMS-certified members and 323 community paramedics operating 33 frontline engines, 7 truck companies, 38 rescue and 3 rural Type 6 squads providing fire, EMS, technical rescue, and all-hazards response. Increased risk Countywide, population is projected to triple in under 20 years. The county grew by roughly 6% between April 2020 and 2024/2025, and the metro area is one of the fastest growing in the US. It also has one of the fastest-growing senior populations in the western U.S. due to the warm climate, tax advantages, and active-living communities. NV Dept of Health and Human Services reports that adults aged 65 and older now make up more than 16% of Clark County's population, but the lack of home-based support, caregiving staff, and affordable long-term care options escalates dependence on emergency services. NV ranks 47th for healthcare access in U.S. News & World Report rankings. Regarding long-term care, NV ranks 49th for affordability and access on AARP's Long-Term Services and Supports State Scorecard. The area faces aging infrastructure challenges and annually increasing water shortages, particularly in older residential areas and high-rise condos. Due to dependence upon the CO River and long-term drought, regional water supply declines each year (7% in 2026). A quarter of State bridges are over 50 years old. Utility and drainage systems are outdated and hazardous. Simultaneously ever-increasing natural disasters, including wildfires, exacerbate risk. CCFD's first-line response area includes suburban and rural communities in Moapa Valley and outside the borders of North Las Vegas, City of Las Vegas, Henderson, Boulder City, and Mesquite. Mutual and auto aid areas include each city above plus Nellis Air Force Base; San Bernardino County (the largest contiguous county in the US); and bordering BLM, National Park Service, Fish and Wildlife Service, and US Forest Service lands. This vast local footprint,

paired with national wildfire deployments, frequently depletes the capacity of resources and firefighters available for immediate local response.
