Educational Priority Areas	Research and Analysis
• Expansion of Open Schools, Open Doors • CCSD Collaboration with Clark County on children's mental health and access to services. • CCSD Collaboration with Clark County on school construction/renovation. • Identification of rural-specific education issues. • Embed the County's Truancy Prevention Outreach Program (TPOP) into CCSD. • Status of the Lundy Elementary School on Mt. Charleston • Focus on early childhood education.	• Review the governance structure of the CCSD Board of Trustees. • Determine all existing CCSD partnerships.

Open Schools, Open Doors Update

JULY 9 COUNTY–CCSD DISCUSSION

SHARED GOAL

Expand public access to school facilities while addressing:

- Student and campus safety
- Operational feasibility
- Custodial, maintenance, and wear-and-tear costs

PROGRESS AND NEXT STEPS

- County expressed openness to shared costs
- Identify approximately 10 schools in areas with the greatest need for access
- Estimate custodial and facility-impact costs
- Update the 2019 agreement; CCSD is awaiting County revisions

WHEN FINALIZED

The Clark County agreement can serve as a model for other municipalities.

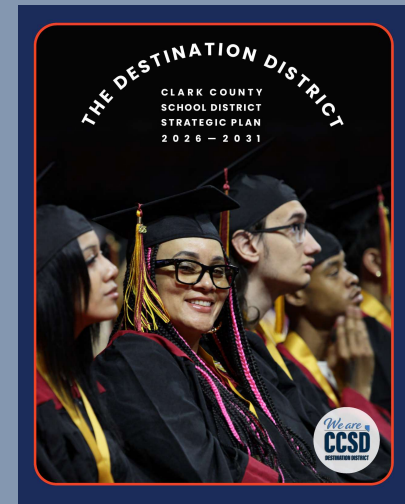
Accelerate literacy and math proficiency and expand future-ready learning models.

1,371 first-day vacancies in 2022–2023

324 first-day vacancies in 2025–2026

Approximately 160 current vacancies for 2026–2027 as of July 17

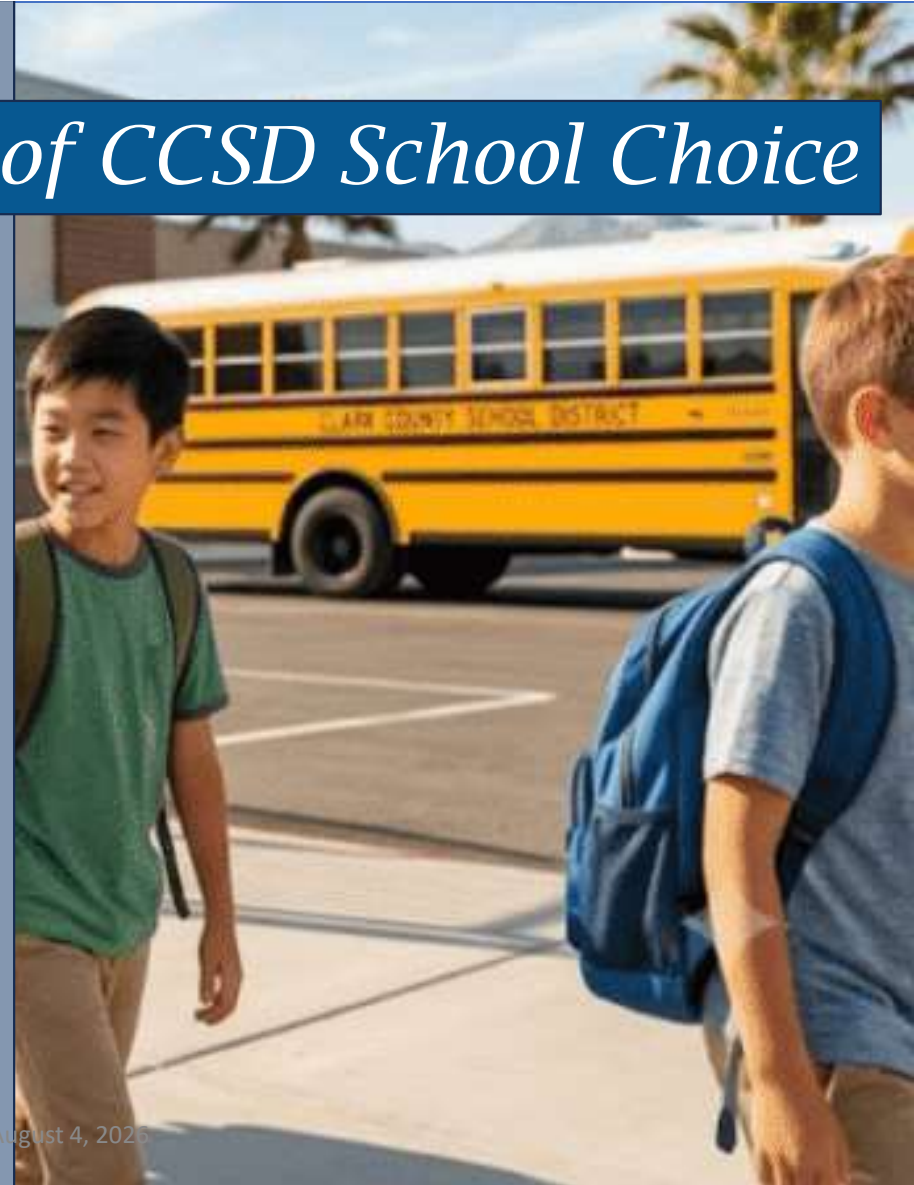

Budget Adoption and Efficiency Work

Fiscal stewardship

FY 2027 final budget adopted unanimously

\$8.561 billion in net authorized spending across operating, capital, grant, and enterprise funds

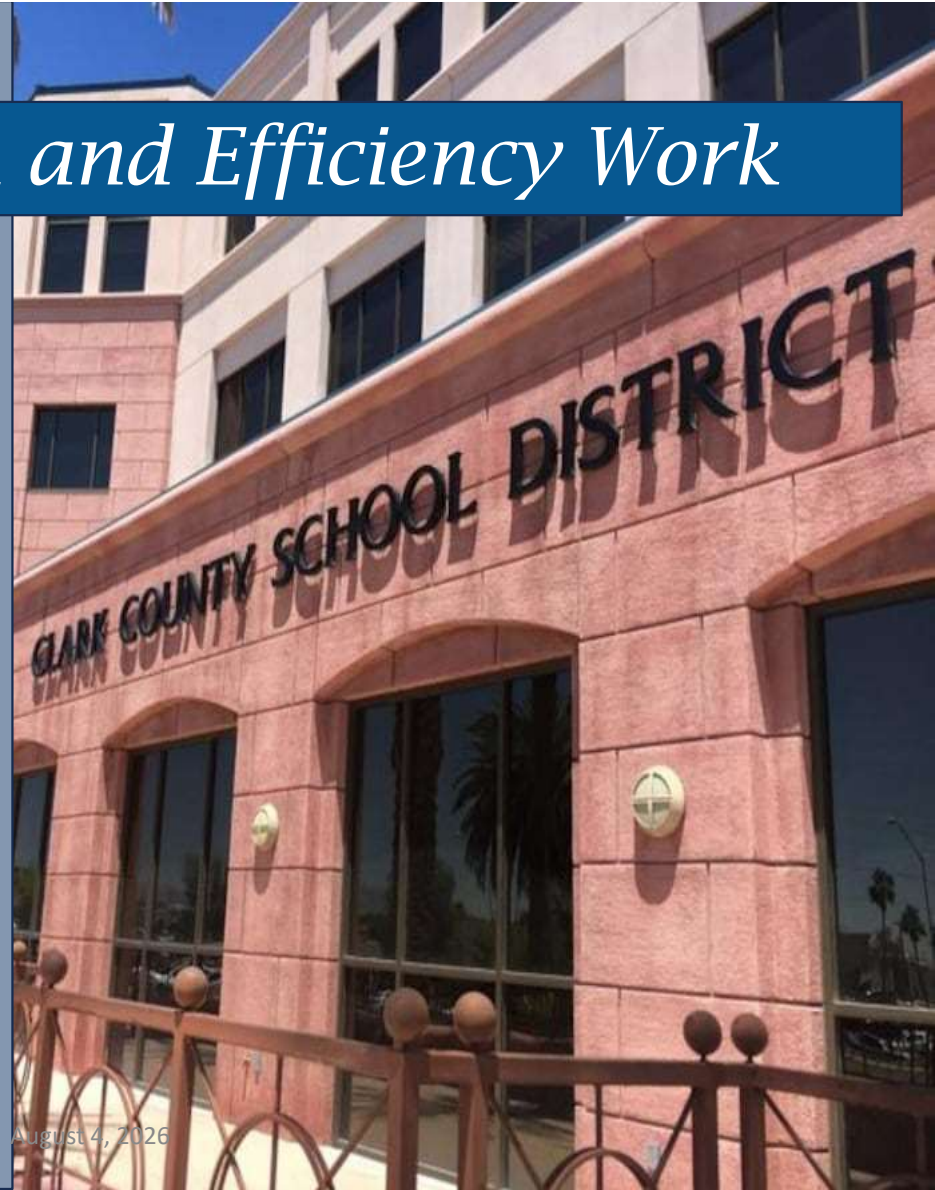
Independent efficiency study identified opportunities for up to \$80 million in annually recurring general-fund savings

Study cost: \$1.4 million one time

Implementation decisions will determine the realized savings and student impact.

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Board Governance and Accountability Updates

Recent Board actions

- Approved the 2026–2027 superintendent evaluation process
- Focused evaluation targets will be set at a future public meeting
- Evaluation cycle includes goal setting, midyear review, progress review, and summative evaluation
- Continued preparation of CCSD priorities for the 2027 Legislative Session
- Bill draft requests are due to the Legislative Counsel Bureau by September 1
