




Economic Impacts of the Pandemic

Unemployment

- Unemployment rate has been declining since March 2020, but not yet to pre-pandemic levels
- Unemployment rate reached more than double the national rate in Spring 2020 and is still higher than the national rate
- Clark County has lower average weekly wages than national average
 - U.S. = \$1,339
 - Las Vegas Area = \$1,141
- Tourism business in Las Vegas is returning quickly, with major organizations like Cirque du Soleil resuming operations this summer






Challenges for Clark County's Workforce

- 1. Much higher job loss than in other metro areas
- 2. Many workers where already underemployed relative to their educational attainment
- Even so educational attainment of labor force is concentrated at lower education levels
- 4. Growth in household income had lagged other metro areas even before the pandemic
- 5. Most occupations and employment are in lower wage areas

About the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

- ✓ Signed into law by President Biden on March 11, 2021
- ✓ Provides \$1.9 trillion in funding over the next several years to help the US recover from the COVID-19 pandemic
- ✓ Clark County to receive **\$440 million** from ARPA over the next two years
 - ✓ First interim report due August 31, 2021





Approved Uses of Funding

- 1. Public Health
 - COVID-19
 - Behavioral Health
 - Payroll
- 2. Economic Impacts
 - Households
 - Public Sector
 - Hardest-Hit Communities
 - Small Businesses and Nonprofits

- 3. Revenue Loss
- 4. Premium Pay for Essential Workers
- 5. Water, Sewer and Broadband Infrastructure



Small Business and Non-Profit Support Activities

- Loans or grants to mitigate financial impacts from revenue loss / closure
- 2. Funding to implement COVID-19 prevention and mitigation
- 3. **Technical assistance** such as counseling or other services to assist business planning needs
- 4. Aid to impacted industries such as tourism, travel and hospitality
 - COVID -19 mitigation such as improvements to ventilation
 - Development of safe reopening plans
 - Upgrades delayed due to the pandemic



Assistance to Unemployed Workers

1. Job Training to facilitate rehiring of unemployed workers

2. Available to assist:

- Those unemployed due to pandemic or associated recession
- Workers already unemployed when the pandemic hit
- Individuals employed part time that want to work full time
